FROM THE PRESIDENT

Dear East Catholic Family,

It has been my distinct honor to be back on the Hill leading our wonderful school. While I had been back on campus a few times since graduating in 1985, I will admit that I had not stayed as strongly connected over the years. For those of you who have lost touch, I hope this update may get you reconnected. For those of you who have stayed close, I hope you get some reassurance that we are making substantial progress, continuing the work begun in 1961.

As we begin to see some light at the end of this pandemic tunnel, I would like to provide our students, faculty, staff, parents, alumni, and friends with a state of the school update.

COVID-19:

We are very proud of our school community and the way they have handled themselves during the pandemic. One way hallways and staircases, socially distant seating arrangements, hand washing, sanitizing, and most importantly mask wearing, have been the norm all year. On September 8th we opened school with a planned hybrid training period of 14 days. On September 25th we began full in-person learning, and with the exception of three short periods of fully remote learning, we have managed to remain mostly in-person. We have allowed students who need to be fully remote to make that choice.

90% of our faculty and staff are fully vaccinated, and now that the State of Connecticut has opened vaccines to those 16 years old and older, we are beginning to get some of our students vaccinated as well.

FINANCIAL SITUATION:

Last year, East Catholic put out a letter to some of our community about financial difficulties the school was having. The letter inferred that East Catholic was four million dollars in debt and appealed to alumni, parents, and friends to give to East Catholic to help bridge that deficit. Many thanks to all who came forward and continue to do so. Please allow me to provide an update on where we now stand.

We are incredibly grateful to the Archdiocese of Hartford and to the five area parishes who were able to put together four million dollars and formed the St. Thomas Aquinas Trust to assist East Catholic. Currently, we have used \$1,200,000 to pay off the bank loan that remained from the Science and Math addition completed in 2015. We have budgeted for the debt service needed, including balloon payments. We are fortunate to have emergency funds set aside if needed, but we are working hard to avoid using them.

As of April 1, 2021, we have been fiscally responsible without compromising the overall student experience. We are well under budget for the 2020-21 school year and expect to finish the year with at least a balanced budget, if not a small surplus. I am thankful to the budget holders in our academic, athletic, facilities, technology, admissions, and advancement departments for their responsible approach to spending. As we head into 2021-22, we are on much more solid footing financially.

INCLUSION

Each year, I select a theme for the year, and for the 2020-21 school year, East Catholic has focused on the theme of INCLUSION. At the beginning of the year, I had the chance to speak with each class on the topic citing the importance of kindness and respect towards all with whom we come into contact. I reminded them of the ECHS Mission Statement which closes with, "Guided by the teachings of Jesus Christ, East Catholic is a welcoming environment for all students." To help with this important messaging, I asked two seniors, Jencih Manhertz and Mackenzie Talavera, to speak with each class on this topic, and they did a great job speaking out against racism, implicit bias, microagressions, and cultural appreciation. Throughout the year, their leadership has proven to be a blessing with the formation of a Students of Color Union and a robust celebration of Black History Month. We are fortunate to have such thoughtful and passionate students at our school.

ADMISSIONS:

Enrollment remains a challenge for many Catholic schools, and we are working hard to attract as many mission-appropriate students as we can for the 2021-22 school year. We have had a number of information nights and virtual Open House opportunities. The Admissions Office has worked tirelessly to ensure that we will have another strong class of freshmen, as well as transfer students who will join the rising sophomore and junior classes. Many families have noted that East Catholic's ability to primarily remain in-person, five days per week significantly influenced their decision.

We are still accepting applications for next year; so if you know of anyone who might be a good fit, please have them contact our Admissions Office.

ADVANCEMENT:

One of the terrific benefits of being an alumnus in the position of President is that I have been able to reconnect with many alumni from my era, as well as get to know alums from before and after my time at East. The pandemic has provided many challenges for events and gatherings, but we were able to have a successful Walkathon in the fall, and we are looking forward to our spring event coming up on May 1st. Our Taste of East event will be virtual, but fun! Please see info on the back cover of this publication. Coming up on June 11th we will be having our 30th Anniversary Golf Tournament. Hope to see many of you there!

While we have strengthened our financial footing, we certainly still need a great deal of philanthropic support from our East Catholic family. Please consider a gift to our Annual Fund, Future in Focus, or other fundraising opportunities here on the Hill!

As we head into spring, please know that we continue to do great work here at East Catholic. I have never been more proud of our students and entire ECHS family. My "door" is always open, so please reach out by phone, email, or in person with any thoughts, questions, or concerns you have. I look forward to hearing from you!

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New Administrators and Faculty Join East Catholic's Team

East Catholic welcomes new faces, and familiar faces in new roles, to the faculty and administration this year. With new demands emerging in education, our community is fortunate to have the following educators join the faculty: Fine Arts teacher Ms. Heather Brasche, Spanish teachers Mr. Spencer Butter and Mr. Colin Petramale, Latin teacher Mr. Kevin McGinnis, and Science teacher Mr. Noah Leonard '16. The Math department is delighted to have Ms. Kathleen Reilly '83 return this year, and to have Mr. Chad Malone '08 teach the new Integrated Technology class in the fall. The English department was equally happy to have Ms. Tammy Young '86 serve as its short-term maternity substitute teacher.

Playing a critical role in these new hires, Mrs. Jan Reilly seamlessly transitioned this summer into her new responsibilities as Dean of Student Life, a position she was appointed to fill by Interim Head of School Val Mara this past spring. Having served the school in multiple capacities since 1979, Mrs. Reilly relishes this opportunity to bring her knowledge of school culture and her passion for East Catholic to administration. First hired to teach Physical Education and coach Girls Track, she has since taught Spanish, served as World Languages department chair, and coached Cheerleading and Field Hockey as well. As Dean of Student Life, she serves on the administrative Senior Leadership Team, oversees student activities and athletics, reinforces the school's disciplinary and cultural standards, and as the need arises, plays a key role in contact tracing to keep our community members as healthy and safe as possible. She prioritizes being proactive with students, eager to learn each student's name even though that is harder to do with the need for student masks. She remains grateful for the faculty, which "has come together time and again" this year, and has been "very supportive" of her as her career evolves again. With so many years dedicated to East Catholic, she still loves "going to school," which she dis-

tinguishes from "going to work," each day. "I'll know it's time to leave when it's not fun anymore," she says. In the meantime, she'll keep showing up for her "second family."

Mr. Sean Brennan '85 keeps showing up too, rising to challenges and embracing possibilities that come with his new position as East Catholic Presi-

dent. A former English teacher, coach and administrator, he recently served as Head of School of Vermont Academy in Saxtons River, VT from 2009-2016, and as Assistant Headmaster and Upper School Head at Austin Prep in Reading, MA from 2017-2020. Last spring, as he sought new opportunities in school leadership, fellow alumni

Kevin Carroll '94 and Mike Seeger '86 contacted him about East Catholic's open position. His initial interest expanded quickly, and "I was sold once I interviewed, meeting teachers, kids and stakeholders, and realizing I can help this place" at a critical point in the school's history. With his experience "shepherding Vermont Academy through a fiscal recovery effort of significant proportion," he knows how to manage "exactly what needs to happen here. At this point we're stabilizing and now need to grow," a goal he is ready

Fact #3: Favorite "Vacation Mode" Books or Shows



The Chrysalis Season

"To everything there is a season, and a time to every purpose under heaven" (Ecclesiastes 3:1). This Biblical wisdom resonates in current times, when even the word "season" seems redefined. With traditional school and societal calendars upended, we find ourselves in a "chrysalis season" of sorts, a transformation period where necessary change unfolds out of direct view.

At East Catholic, "chrysalis season" has brought rapid metamorphosis in multiple contexts. With President Sean Brennan '85, Dean of Academics Susan Perillo and Dean of Student Life Jan Reilly leading the way, we have adapted behind the scenes to sustain our ongoing growth. Teachers have worked tirelessly to deliver and diversify lessons in completely novel ways; beyond our classes, several departments have effectively resolved new challenges.

The administration, for example, has worked in concert with faculty and staff to complete several tasks beyond the requisite duties of the job, designing multiple schedules, reconfiguring the hallways and stairwells for one-way movement, and revising seating arrangements where students gather. They have coordinated all aspects of contact tracing with School Nurse Diane DeCarlo, of daily cleaning with Head of Buildings and Grounds Rick Mozzicato, of ongoing information

updates with Director of Communications Molly Prospect. Also, they have offered vital guidance to colleagues who are using resources we have to redesign the best ways to serve students.

For the Informational Technology department, this has meant rewiring entire areas of the building, as well as repurposing and refitting many school computers, navigating bandwidth issues that came with livestreaming, and daily coaching of colleagues to keep remote learning successful. Director of IT David Shepherd and IT Assistant Mike Kravontka '03 have accomplished these tasks in a compressed window of time: "To make this work, we basically tore up everything we'd done" in the "initial scramble" to prepare for the school's opening, Mr. Shepherd noted. They have also set up VPN access for teachers teaching from home and capacity for livestreamed events, including Mass. With the exception of grant money for new webcams installed in every classroom, they have handled these tasks without incurring new expenses. "What we've done has been working," Mr. Kravontka noted, already planning with Mr. Shepherd for "reconfiguration once we're on the other side" of this season. As School Counseling department chair and social worker Stacey Boisselle says, "Dave and Mike have been essential" in making sure "the rest of us can do our

jobs and reach our students" so well.

Ms. Boisselle herself exemplifies the collaboration across

departments that has been especially important during these times. Partnering with Ms. Perillo, school counselors and teachers to help students "make the best choices for themselves," she has also helped ensure classes are appropriately staffed and sized in accordance with mandated state guidelines. Her department has maintained its programming in person and virtually; in addition to individual Zoom conferences, counselors have facilitated contact with college representatives, pre-recorded college process information sessions, and planned future sessions on the PSAT/SAT tests as well. With a "heightened need for student support" this year, "our counselors are adamant about maintaining contact, particularly with kids who struggle" as they face uncertainty, Ms. Boisselle says. She has also worked with Dean of Wellness and Athletics Jon Dahlquist to meet with the student Captains Council, as the disruption of sports seasons has affected many student athletes. "Collectively, the adults in the school are working as a team," she says, "so



that we have a net for our students" as they face common and atypical challenges. She and social worker Michelle Corliss steadily offer internal support and resources outside of East Catholic as well.

Similarly, Mr. Dahlquist and Assistant Athletic Director Chad Malone '08 have found ways to help students build resilience, adjusting programs and redesigning protocols while working within school resources. They have brought not only Ms. Boisselle and Mr. Brennan to Captains Council, but also "Own Your Roar" Campaign creator and gymnast Olivia Lubarsky and ESPN's Dan Orlovsky in virtual sessions. Next, they have meticulously adhered to all guidelines issued for student athlete competition by the Centers for Disease Control, the Department of Public Health and the Connecticut Interscholastic Athletic Conference since last spring, "staying true to any mandates given" in real time, Mr. Dahlquist reports. Experts at managing schedules in flux, they spearheaded practices to protect all players, coaches, referees and fans: field stations with masks, wipes, thermometers and sanitizer were set up; practices with masks and fewer athletes in play were held; at times, dual and virtual meets were conducted and games were livestreamed, and innovative ways to honor seniors and hold banquets were created. Mr. Dahlquist emphasizes "the extraordinary dedication of our coaches," and our athletes' "drive to excel on the field no matter what, the joy of playing the sport" even with so many adjustments. He seeks to "give as much credit as one can give" for the grit and grace on display throughout an extended preseason and an abbreviated season.





Both qualities also characterize students and leaders in service and student government. Director of Campus Ministry Patrick McLaughlin states, "We're very happy to maintain our relationships with ImmaCare and South Park Inn in terms of providing meals," though students now prepare food at home and Mr. McLaughlin delivers it himself. In addition, he said, "We've been impressed by the creativity of students as they complete external service opportunities within healthy safety parameters," adding that "it's returning us to a more personal, organic spirit of service." Teaming up with Campus Ministry's STRETCH volunteers, student government leaders raised over \$2,000 through their candy cane sale; the funds were used to buy grocery store gift cards for local families that typically receive donated food baskets. Student government moderator Eric Cruanes, who organized five separate student elections this fall, looks forward to "working on Covid-safe activities for this spring that we can all enjoy."

In Fine Arts, department chair David Brudz is also looking to the spring for new possibilities for displaying visual artworks and musical performances online, augmenting ECCE choir's virtual performances to date. In December, Fine Arts teacher Heather Brasche and the Art Club transformed her office space into an "enchanted forest," designed with "found supplies" that student artists repurposed into a Christmas display. Hoping to "bring Christmas spirit to our community," Ms. Brasche is delighted to see "consistent joy" in response. In the performing arts, Ms. Jillian Quackenbush pivoted from a fall drama to a series of workshops teaching students "how the entire theater works," allowing performers to discover skills "needed to become a stronger version of themselves on stage." Next, she has revamped a traditional spring musical to "A Night on Broadway," a socially distanced cabaret allowing each performer to "safely shine onstage." Such creativity and commitment drive the transformations in all extracurricular activities as "chrysalis season" continues.

These same qualities infuse engagement with past and future families, too. Associate Director of Advancement Heidi Carlson notes that our commitment to all alumni is stronger than ever. "We continue to prioritize personal contact with our graduates from every era," she says, "and look forward to finding new ways to welcome home all East Catholic Eagles." Director of Admissions Mary Roberts reports her department has worked with Communications and Fine Arts colleagues to shift Admissions events to digital platforms, create new promotional videos, design new webinars, add personal elements to student acceptance letters, and expand student outreach to newly accepted students. With plans for more innovations, "We're ready to maintain and enhance our outreach to families," she says. Echoing her colleagues, Ms. Roberts has appreciated new chances to capitalize on our resources to welcome students and help them thrive.

However we have done it, Mr. Brennan affirms, "We're still doing great work, regardless of the medium" through which we have delivered it. He cites fellow Middlebury College graduate and Paralympian Chris Waddell's credo, "It's not what happens to you. It's what you do with what happens to you," and surely, East Catholic has done much this "chrysalis season." Mr. Brennan pledges "to always look forward, to ask what's going to happen next." Whatever future seasons arrive, we are poised to fly.


Our New Chaplain

East Catholic Students Accepted to Prestigious Music Programs

Congratulations to Julia Vieira Reis '23 for being selected to join the Connecticut Youth Symphony and the premier Suzuki string orchestra Opus at the Hartt School of Music's Community Division. Descriptions of both programs can be found below.

CYS: Connecticut Youth Symphony challenges motivated high-school musicians in grades 10–12 with the detailed preparation and performance of symphonic masterworks, concerti, and contemporary works. Each year CYS performs three major concerts and hosts a concerto competition for the Hartt School of Music's Community Division students.

Immersed in a history of excellence, CYS has been providing students an opportunity to study orchestral music intensively for almost 75 years. The Hartt School Training Orchestra was founded in 1938 by Rubin Segal and held its first concert in May 1939. Today, Connecticut Youth Symphony retains its focus: to provide students with a high-quality orchestral experience. Conducted by Dan D'Addio.

OPUS: In 1987, the late David Einfeldt founded the premier Suzuki string orchestra Opus '89 at the Hartt School of Music's Community Division. Today, this string orchestra is open, by audition, to advanced string players, regardless of their training method. This ensemble often collaborates with wind players and percussionists to

perform classical-era orchestral works. Conducted by Emmett Drake.

The Hartt Preparatory Academy (HPA) is a two-year, comprehensive pre-college music training program for high school juniors and seniors. The program includes music theory, ear training, keyboard studies, performances, advanced ensemble, private instruction, and other classes. Students fulfill academic and musical requirements that prepare them for an accelerated undergraduate music degree at the Hartt School. This is an unprecedented curricular pathway approved by the University of Hartford.

At the completion of the program, HPA students who audition for entrance to the University of Hartford and The Hartt School may receive two semesters of credit toward completion of select undergraduate music degrees.

(GHYWE) is the top wind




recently uncovered path after the legendary coach and mentor honors the legacy of Coach Kelly, still felt today among the men gathered, as well as many more around the country.

Since his arrival, President Sean P. Brennan '85 has revitalized the East Catholic community in many ways, and his decision to make "inclusion" the theme for this school year has been one of his most important vehicles for doing so. As far back as his early football coaching days, he has chosen an annual theme for the teams and schools he has led; "sometimes a specific need determines the theme," he explains, "or a motivational book or program" that serves to inspire the group. "Each year, the theme becomes something to rally around," he elaborates, "and themes often build one upon the other from year to year." As the East Catholic mission calls us to be "a welcoming environment for all students," this year's inclusion theme is an ideal fit.

In choosing it, Mr. Brennan reflected on many important conversations he has had since, as a new hire for his current position, Interim Head of School Val Mara invited him to meet current seniors Christine Duah, Jencih Manhertz and Mackenzie Talavera. In their discussion, they highlighted the need to validate the experiences of East Catholic's students of color, and create new levels of support and advocacy as well. In the weeks that followed, Mr. Brennan has delivered in his commitment to diversity in education and inclusion in community.

First, he invited Jencih and Mackenzie, who officially founded the Student of Color (SOC) Union this summer, to speak to every class at Orientation. In their brief

speech, they encouraged their peers to be open to cultures beyond their own: "Inclusion," said Jencih, is "just the simple idea of respecting and appreciating other people's backgrounds and cultures that define them." Both seniors defined and gave examples of micro-aggressions, cultural appropriation and implicit bias, and urged students to adopt anti-racist behavior. "By doing this," Mackenzie stated, "we create an inclusive environment for all" at East Catholic. The SOC Union, moderated by teachers Lisa Putnam Kirsche '86 and Jenna Taylor-Persico '09, has met each month. "We are grateful to Jencih and Mackenzie for creating this important opportunity to expand support for our students of color, and for all who are eager to build awareness and take action to combat racism," Ms. Taylor stated. This spring, the SOC Union will continue to discuss relevant topics and plan future events as Covid regulations permit.

Next, Mr. Brennan decided to bring back One Book, One Community to East Catholic, with new twists. Not wanting to wait until summer 2021 to reinstitute the community-wide read, Mr. Brennan asked the English department to integrate the 2017 novel *The Hate U Give* by Angie Thomas as the first unit of study in every English class this fall. The department welcomed the chance to do so, holding weekly August meetings to compile resources and design lessons that began in the opening days of school. "Our study of *The Hate U Give* reinforced the English department's commit-

ment to revise curriculum to better reflect the cultural traditions and representation of our students," Ms. Taylor stated. Careful to elicit student feedback, English teachers affirmed the value of this novel study, which validated the experiences of some East Catholic students and broadened the awareness of others.

Models of effective leadership also foster inclusion, as Mr. Brennan recognizes. At his invitation, Eric Kapitulik, founder of The Program, presented an all-school webinar on November 24th, reinforcing the importance of kindness, teamwork and lifting up those around us. The former collegiate athlete, U.S. Marine Corps Officer and Ironman Triathlete discussed the most important qualities of champions, reminding students that the strongest leaders are those who value every team member and leave no one excluded from the team's mission.

As East Catholic recommits to fulfilling its own mission, we can remind ourselves of Rev. Jesse Jackson's straightforward message: "When everyone is included, everyone wins." While inclusion "does not mean you must be best friends with everyone," as Jencih said in her Orientation speech, "We open a new [chapter]" at East Catholic, as Mackenzie said, by providing these opportunities for our students. With Mr. Brennan's expansive experience in Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DEI) as an educator, he has the skills and drive to keep us writing new chapters.





The East Catholic community celebrated the graduation of the Class of 2020 by bringing together revered traditions and innovative events to honor our graduates.

On June 2, Interim Head of School Val Mara opened the live-streamed Virtual Awards Ceremony held in the school's auditorium and broadcast via the school's YouTube channel.
